Moving day has finally arrived! I have too many trees, so it took me three evenings to get all my trees and accents out of my root cellar and outside onto benches. But, somewhere around 200 trees and 60 accents later, they're all outside. Of course, each tree has to be looked over carefully to check its health and condition. Dead leaves that gathered during storage or weren't cleared off last fall have to be cleaned off and early

weeds pulled. Decisions on where trees need to sit on which bench, mental tallies on where I stand on repotting, etc., etc. A lot of work, but a reminder of why we're in the hobby in the first place. The swelling buds seen up close, the delicate colors of new leaves, seeing afresh the changes and advancement of prior work, all comes together in one happy thought: I love bonsai.

our guest speaker last month, Ted Matson. I'd like to send out another thank-you to the Milwaukee folks who shared him with us, and send my appreciation to the membership for their flexibility in moving our meeting date. For May, we have another guest speaker, this time shared with our friends in Prairie State. They are bringing in Dave Kruetz and sharing him with us. Dave is well known for his work with azalea bonsai, and will be speaking to us about the care and needs of azaleas throughout the year.

Folks should be deep into repotting, and while we will not have our normal repotting meeting in May (we have a guest speaker), we will be doing our repotting meeting in June. We'll focus on repotting tropical bonsai, since they are happiest being repotted in the summer months. The club provides turface, soaking tubs, and aluminum wire for the repotting meeting all you need to bring is a tree and a pot to put it into.

Plans for the May show are in full swing. We've lined up some vendors and are going to go with a smaller number of workshops. We have added a club-sponsored workshop for absolute beginners, and are scheduling some introto-bonsai lectures for the general public. For our newer members, the aim of our Spring show is education and recruitment. We show trees in different stages of training, with write-ups to accompany them to explain the processes being used. The goal is to demystify bonsai, show that it's a process that can be learned, and offer ourselves as the place where they could start learning. The general public mostly sees advanced bonsai, like the ones on display at the Garden, and has no idea of how the trees have gotten to that stage. Our aim is to show how the trees progress via different training methods. Everyone is welcome to show trees they are working on, and are encouraged to write a paragraph or two of history or explanation of the tree. This is not a formal show. so there should be no excuses of 'my tree isn't ready to display'. That's the point! Don't be shy, bring them in!

Looking forward to seeing everyone again May, please forgive me if I have dirt under my fingernails from repotting!



Monthly Care Report: What to Do in May

Continue repotting deciduous trees through April and wrap up any repotting of pines by early in the month of May. Remember to keep them in the shade for a couple weeks. Trees repotted in April can be given their first light doses of fertilizer.

Continue to patrol for insects and adjust your watering to match the warmer weather. Candles on pines can be pinched any time they are big enough. Start with the weak buds and do the strong buds a week or so later. Spruce, junipers and larch shoots are probably ready for their first pinching of the season. Watch the new growth on your deciduous trees and trim back to 1-2 pairs of leaves. It is critical to stay on top of maples now and pinch out that center bud just as it emerges from the middle of the first two leaves. Continue feeding your trees on a regular basis.

By May most deciduous trees have come into leaf and new candles on pines have sprouted. Watering schedule may be started. Cuttings of evergreens may still be taken. Airlayering of deciduous and evergreens can be continued. Pinch back long shoots of deciduous trees as sudden frosts can damage the young leaves. Your feeding, pinching, watering, and pruning schedules should be in full swing by now. May is not too late for repotting or field collecting, but this requires increasingly careful after-care as the season

progresses. Trees repotted or collected in May should be protected from strong sun and wind until strong growth is observed, and leafy trees may suffer from transplant shock, so roots should be left intact as much as possible.

Careful use of insecticides becomes increasingly useful at this time of year. Always read and follow manufacturer's directions, but keep in mind that trees in containers may do better with slightly diluted formulations. Watch wired branches carefully to avoid unsightly spiral scars from bark growing over the wires, deciduous trees in particular can expand very quickly in May.

PRUNING... After our winter months some trees have wanted to grow out of proportion, especially Ficus, which are indoors. Still a little too early to set outside. So now is the time to prune for shape. You can also root prune and repot your tropicals now. Now is when you really have to keep on top of your pruning to increase ramification. Even though your Serissa might be blooming, prune back for better ramification and many more blooms later in the summer. After each branch on your Bougainvillea is bloomed out, cut those branches way back. Keep the growth tips pinched on your Maples. Keep pruning your Elms back to the first or second node.

FERTILIZE... You can start on your summer feeding program late May. All of

vour deciduous trees are hardened, so feed them. Young trees more nitrogen, older ones a more balanced food to maintain them. Any tree you have cut back hard, place in shade until new growth starts and wait till they have flushed back out to feed them. Be careful not to over water, trees need leaves to transpire water. Blooming varieties can be fed with a fertilizer with a higher middle number. You want you trees healthy to prepare them for the hot summer months.

INSECTS... You should be checking daily for any insect problems. Aphids love spring growth and can get out of hand before you know it. Look for scale on the underside of the leaves. You can use a granular systemic insecticide which main ingredient is Imidacloprid. This only kills non beneficial insects.


