Monthly Care Report:

What to Do in November

NOVEMBER IS HERE... A very busy month. It is time to put everything up for the winter.

WINTER PREP...

Prepare your trees for their winter setting, whether it be a green house, cold frame or whatever type of winter protection you may have. If you put your trees away for the winter be sure to inspect them for pests like mealy bugs or scale before setting them in their winter quarters. Don't forget to pull any weeds and clean dropped leaves off your soil surfaces since they can provide shelter for unwanted pests. Remove all dead leaves and branches. You can combine insecticide and fungicide and apply a preventative spray treatment. Don't mulch too early or you may get creatures (e.g. mice) nesting in it and they will damage your trees.

PRUNING..

When I bring my trees in, I prune back the tips and thin them out some, this allows more light to reach the lower branches. Your trees will be getting less sun in the winter so keeping them thinned out a little will keep you from losing the fine twigging that you worked all summer to get.

Thinking ahead, write down and plan what you need to do for spring and choose which trees you will work on first.

INDOORS ...

All of your tropical trees should be inside by now. They should receive as much light during the day as possible. If you have plants under lights (as I have) they should be on approximately 12 hours a day. A small greenhouse is great.

If you have a greenhouse with plastic on it check the plastic to make sure it will make the winter, if the plastic is dirty clean it to allow as much light in as possible.

OUTDOORS...

Your trees will naturally acclimate to cooler weather and the longer you have them the better they will do here. During November deciduous and evergreen trees can remain totally exposed until about the last week of the month. A gradual decrease in temperature going into winter is best. Elm, Holly, Juniper, Maple, Boxwood, Pine and all other cold hardy varieties should be left outside, they need the cold.

During November we typically get our first heavy freezes so be prepared to protect your trees. November can bring long rainy spells so shelter those trees that are sensitive to excess rain, such as pines. Once leaves have

dropped from your deciduous trees is a good time to begin needle thinning your two needle pines. If you thin last year's needles by pulling be careful to pull in the direction they grow. Otherwise, you will most likely lose the bud you are trying to stimulate. Safer approach is to cut off needles, rather than pulling. On strong, well-developed pines, you can also thin this year's needles by thinning to 5 or 6 pairs of needles in the top half of the trees and 7 or 8 pairs in the lower half of the trees.

WATERING...

Morning watering is still the best. But if the night is going to be cold, watering just the soil in the evening will help maintain temperature in the pot and protect the roots better.

Growing Moss for your Bonsai

Every show season it seems people are looking for moss to put on their exhibits because sun-hardy moss is difficult to find. There is, however, a fairly easy method to extend your supply of moss, and that would be to grow your own.

There are over 12,000 species of moss. Most like shade, some tolerate sun, some grow best on dense organic soils, and some prefer aggregate sandy mixes. The method I will give you here does not guarantee success, but tries to give a good balance of conditions to give any moss a reasonable chance to thrive.

Step 1: Find some live moss.

Go out and collect moss that is growing under the general conditions you will be keeping it in. If you grow in turface, find moss on rocky soil or in the cracks of patios and driveways. If you grow in nursery soil, collect it from the topsoil under trees or other organic soil areas. Collect as much as you can. The more the better.

Step 2: Prep your growing container.

Choose a flat container like a boot tray, propagation tray, or even a cookie sheet. The container should have light drainage to prevent standing water, but not so much drainage that the planting medium you use will dry rapidly. Evenly spread a thin layer (about ½ inch) of your growing medium in the bottom of the tray.

Step 3: Grind the collected moss.

Using a blender or food processor, grind up the moss you collected with an equal portion of dry sphagnum moss. You will probably need to add a portion of water equal to the combined

volume of the dry and live mosses. Process the mixture until it has roughly the consistency of oatmeal.

Step 4: Apply the mixture to the container.

Spread the mixture evenly on top of the growing medium in the container. Try to maintain a layer about ¼ to ½ inch thick.

Step 5: Saturate the moss and the medium.

Using a hose nozzle set to mist or some other very gentle applicator, thoroughly water the moss mixture and the medium beneath.

Step 6: Protect the surface from full sun.

Lay some shelf liner or heavy window screen on the surface of the wet mixture to protect the recovering moss from direct sun exposure, but do not place the container in full shade. The regrowing moss will need good light to thrive.

Step 7: Do not let the moss dry out.

Maintain moist to wet conditions in the container. If the mix dries out it can be reground and spread again, but your chances of success will be much reduced. It is best to keep the moss mixture damp until the moss is very well established.

Step 8: Use your new moss.

Once the moss has established itself in a uniform carpet of green, use it to dress your pots. After the show, if you like, you can recycle the moss using the same steps above and expand your on hand moss supplies.


General Meetings
